






ATTACH ALL THE PIECES TOGETHER








The use of threads to attach all the individual pieces to make a complete artefact is a metaphor for the cross-cultural connection between us, despite our different ethnicities, nationalities, and cultures.





PROJECT FINDINGS

There were a lot of learnings through the process, about the refugees, their feelings, their cultures, and identities. Some learning are as follows:

- among refugees.

• Significance of Equality: The process underscored the crucial role of equality. The absence of equality often leads to experiences of injustice and frustration

• Unlearning and Decolonisation: The endeavor involved more than just decolonising preconceived notions; it required a substantial amount of unlearning, accepting, and relearning. Specific ideas had to be reconsidered to genuinely understand the experiences of refugees.

• Challenges of Refugee Life: As an individual, it was eye-opening to comprehend the challenges refugees face. This includes instances where basic rights to live and survive are sometimes denied, exposing the refugees to a particularly challenging lifestyle. This realisation emphasised the need for empathy and understanding in addressing the difficulties refugees encounter.

> Therefore, we hope that the formation of our artefact can bring out particular emotions that the refugees and international students, or anyone that is living in a foreign country can relate to. Because we can reflect on our feelings and tell our story through the process of creating this artefact.

Throughout the entire process, different workshops brought us many new perspectives to better comprehend decolonisation, from involving minority cultural groups in the artistic creation to reading poetry in different languages, all of which helped us understand the power and value of respecting multiculturalism
